President's Message

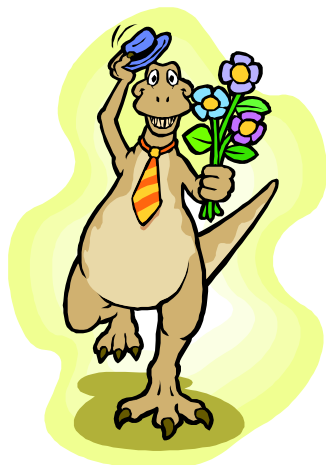

Bob Carroll

While thumbing through the Tucson Show Guide, I came across the name of someone who many of us know, Bob Carroll. The article included in the Guide is as follows:

“Black Cat Mountain Trilobites, a Profile of Bob Carroll” by George Winters

Robert “Bob” Carroll is the founder and owner of Carroll and C. Enterprises, a company he started in 1986 after reading Riccardo Levi-Setti’s book, “Trilobites”. Bob, a Viet-Nam era Navy veteran, worked for a while as a tile setter after receiving his honorable discharge. But once the fossil bug bit, he looked for land he could lease to collect and prepare the trilobites he had read about. A self taught Preparator with assistance from Scott Virgiles, Zarko Ljuboja and Leon Theison, Bob quickly became one of the best known “shooters” in the trade.

I have known Bob for over 17 years, meeting him during the first of the Tucson Shows I attended back in 1988. That is when most of the fossil dealers were located at the Pueblo Inn on the service road of I-10. From those early days, Bob has dealt exclusively in Oklahoma trilobites, collected, prepared and labeled by the “master” himself.

His quarry from which all of the “Black Cat Mountain trilobites” are collected is located in Coal County, Oklahoma. The quarry and prep lab, which is located in the very small town of Clarita, is where Bob spends the summer collecting and the rest of the year preparing his “bugs” for the Arizona Mineral and Fossil Show.

It may take anywhere from 5 to 24 hours to finish prepping even a single trilobite such as a *Kainops raymondi*, while complicated specimens such as a *Dicranurus hamatus* or *Ceratonurus* sp. May take even longer to complete.

Bob has discovered two new species, another trilobite; *Cyphaspis carrolli* was named in his honor. He had donated dozens of specimens to museums and universities, and several that he collected and prepared now reside as type specimens in research collections. This past year, he was instrumental in getting a name placed with the “Bug X”, a small Lichid trilobite, which is now known to be *Ancanthopyge consanguinea*. Several specimens were donated to the University of Kansas, and Dr. Bruce Lieberman and his grad students discovered that the little trilobite had actually been described back in the late 1800’s

from fragmentary specimens found in upstate New York.

Over the years, Bob has developed a following of collectors that visit him during the Tucson Show just to see what new treasures he has to offer. New species, as well as large and desirable specimens are quickly purchased by early bird shoppers and the lucky few that wander into his rooms at the Inn Suites Hotel.

If you get to the show during the first week, you can visit Bob and his lovely wife Linda in rooms 224 and 225 at the Inn Suites Hotel located at 475 North Granada before he sells out of inventory. Bob has donated a very nice *Kettneraspis williamsi* for the AAPS auction this year.

Directions

Westcave Preserve is located in southwest Travis County, approximately 45 minutes from downtown Austin.

From Austin: Travel west on Highway 71 to the village of Bee Caves. Turn left at Ranch Road 3238 locally known as Hamilton Pool Road. Travel 14 ½ miles on Hamilton Pool Road to the Pedernales River. Westcave Preserve is the first gate on your right after crossing the river.

From Areas West of Westcave Preserve: Take Highway 281 to the village of Round Mountain. In Round Mountain, turn east on Ranch Road 962. Travel 17 miles on Ranch Road 962. The gate to Westcave Preserve will be on your left. (Note: To remain on Ranch Road 962, veer left at the y-intersection after Cypress Creek).
