

#### Bio for John R. Moffitt

theoretical Α astrophysicist education, John Russell Moffitt has been a member of the Houston Gem and Mineral **Society** (HGMS) since 1972 and is a president past of that organization. During his



years with the HGMS, he served as chair of the

Paleontology Section three times, and was their field trip leader four times. John believes that for clubs to be stable and well attended over the long haul, meetings must be interesting and something that people look forward to attending. In his professional career, John has served in mostly management positions over the past 30 years, but has also served on the boards of three non-profit corporations. Under John's leadership, the HGMS Paleontology Section purchased and set up a sophisticated fossil cleaning station, making the HGMS one of the first gem and mineral societies to have such a permanent installation.

John has also been an occasional member of the Dallas paleo club, the Austin club, the Clear Lake club, and the Rolling Rock club during these years. For the last 30 years, John has also been a member of **Mid-American Paleontology Society (MAPS)**, and has been a regular at their annual convention in

Illinois and now in Glen Rose, Texas. John has been a frequent contributor to the HGMS newsletter, the MAPS newsletter and other publications. He has led many paleontology field trips for local school children and adults during his spare time. John is a frequent public speaker and has given lectures on fossils and certain localities as well as on quality fossil preparation. John is a past International Director for Toastmasters International and often gives keynote addresses for a fee. He usually speaks for free to local schools and other organizations including the SCFMS conference, other Gem and Mineral Societies, and the Houston Museum of Natural Science.

John has also led several field trips to the Sahara **Desert**, and as a result of one of these trips ended up in Prague working with the National Museum to republish an important classic trilobite reference from 1852. Upon John's return from living in Europe, John was elected First Vice-President of the HGMS for 2001. He also took on the job of 2001 Show Chairman for the annual Houston show in September. He was able to move the show from the George R. Brown downtown to its present location at the Humble Convention Center and made it a successful and profitable show for its first year at the new location. The show has continued to grow in the new location each year and hosts the national show in 2008. In 2002, John earned the Rockhound of the Year Award through the AFMS, the same year that he was elected **President** of the **HGMS**. In 2004, John was made an honorary lifetime member of the HGMS. In 2005. John was asked to serve as a Vice-President of the SCFMS (South Central Federation of Mineralogical Societies).

In 2001 John was first nominated, and in 2002 was inducted into the **Rockhound Hall of Fame**, for works in paleontology and for being a leader in the field for over 20 years. **The National Rockhound & Lapidary Hall of Fame**, located in South Dakota and sponsored by the Lapidary Journal, receives nominations in six categories from rock clubs all over the United States. Since 1987, six people are inducted each year under Minerals, Lapidary, Jewelry, Fossils, Education and Deceased. The basis of this induction is rooted in contributions at both the national and international level, as voted on by their peers.

John is a strong supporter of **Earth Science Education** and works to educate people on the importance of studying the fossil record and actively promotes free and open collection of fossil material on public lands. John's **collection of trilobites** is considered world-class and was featured in a special exhibit at the Houston Museum of Natural Science in 1995/1996. His love of geology, paleontology, and astrophysics drive him to share his ideas and goals with others.

John is also a member and supporter of the **Association of Applied Paleontological Sciences**, organized to create a professional association of commercial fossil and mineral collectors. The AAPS promotes ethical collecting practices and cooperative liaisons with researchers, instructors, curators and exhibit managers in the academic and museum paleontological community. John constantly strives to show others how to respect collecting sites so future generations can also have access to fossils and minerals, in order to learn to love the earth and all of its wonders.
