

March Field Trip Report

Jasper & Vicinity

As I drove through Crockett, I knew I was going to enjoy this trip. The dogwoods were in bloom -- both pink and white. The azaleas were in every yard; mostly in reds, but in shades ranging almost to white. A few redbuds were still hanging on. There were bluebonnets and many other flowers. Add in the variegated greens of the mixed hardwood/piney woods -- East Texas in the spring is a lovely place to be.

Saturday morning at The Stump we had seventeen members present. David and Mark Lindberg, Ron and Janet Root, John Hinte, Linda and Bruce McCall, Katie Henry, Melvin Noble, Gary Vliet, Tom and Beverly Trunick, Bob McDonald, Melody Barnett, Rich Geist and myself. Of course our much appreciated hosts, Ron and Donna DuCote were there to welcome us back.

When we arrived at the creek, no one wasted any time before jumping in. More wood than a person could really look at, much less carry out. While we did our best to remove as much as possible, I doubt that anyone coming after us could tell we'd been there -- other than our footprints. There is still discussion as to the age of this wood. We had originally been told that it was Catahoula Formation, Oligocene. On some USGS maps the Catahoula is listed as Miocene -- on the section map for the Jasper area it is listed as Oligocene. I'm told that Scott Singletons' latest word is that it is Miocene. One unusual item was found. John tells me that one piece of wood that he picked up turned out to be a big chunk of mammoth tooth, so there must be Pleistocene material around washing into the creek.

I had directions to some other sites, but the first couldn't be located. The second was a road cut with *Protoscutella mississippiensis mississippiensis* (sand dollars) in a limey sandstone. I believe everyone was able to chop one or more out. This material is so much easier to work with than the hard glauconite. Also, scallops, gastropods, oysters and bryozoans. Our last site was somewhat of a disappointment --my fault. We arrived at a quarry with barely an hour of daylight left. And the gate was locked. I had planned to drive to the bottom of the quarry. We were allowed in, just not our vehicles. It was a long walk down and back and we were after big blocks of *Protoscutella*. I'll know next yearbring a wagon.

We did walk around and pick up a few things, but it was not as planned.

Sunday we started out on University Dr. in Nacogdoches. A few sand dollars were chopped out. At one of the other sites we picked up some oysters and I found a part of a crab carapace. We didn't stay long; things were getting overgrown and the sites are smaller. On to the last stop: Lake Nacogdoches. We had a good time picking up *Archohelia*, *Balanophyllia* and *Madracis* corals, a large number of gastropods, shark teeth and the occasional bivalve. As always, East Texas was a wonderful trip and sorry to all who missed it. I look forward to seeing all of you at the auction.

PSoA March Meeting Minutes Tuesday, March 17, 2009

SPEAKER: George Phillips of the Conservation & Biodiversity Section, Mississippi Museum of Natural Science in Jackson, MS gave a talk on "Sand Dollars" (Echinoidea: Cassiduloida: Faujasiidae) in the Upper Cretaceous of North America.

The meeting was called to order at 8:35pm by President Ed Elliot.

The meeting minutes from February were approved.

OLD BUSINESS

ACCOUNTS: Treasurer David Lindberg reported \$4130.19 in the checking account. Joan Crane noted there is \$8229.80 in the old APS account. Joan suggested that we start looking around for a bank giving more interest. The CTPS account is at BofA and is not earning any interest. Mike Smith suggested that the Treasurer initiate a search of banks and look for one that has experience with non-profits. Some of the money needs to go into a CD, some needs to be available to Fossil Fest and seem needs to go to scholarship.

NON-PROFIT INFORMATION:

Mike Smith mentioned that PSoA may be able to give Ed Bowden's widow a tax break for all the fossil donations (a little over \$3000) since our non-profit status is retroactive to 2007. She could do a 1040x retroactively.

Now that PSoA is a non-profit, an online IRS form will need to be filled out and submitted by May 15th annually. Additionally, if there is some legislation that is of interest to the club, PSoA cannot take a stand on it and maintain non-profit status. One remaining piece of business is to notify the state of Texas that PSoA is now federally tax exempt in order to obtain a state tax exempt number.

OLD BUSINESS

WILLIAMSON COUNTY GEM & MINERAL SOCIETY SHOW:

Jamie Young reported on the Williamson County Gem & Mineral Society show. Joan Crane, John Hinte, Marilyn Austin and Jamie Young worked the show on Saturday, February 24. On Sunday February 25, Ed Elliot, Ron Root, Bill Hill and Jean Wallace helped out. The show was very successful. There were lots of kids and adults who stopped by the booth. PSoA had some giveaways for all ages. Rochelle thanked everyone for their help and support. The dealers were very happy with the show.

LIBRARY:

Tommie Potts of the AGMS donated the book "Sea Monsters" to the Paleo Society for its library. Thank you Tommie!

Jamie Young inquired about obtaining a current list of the PSoA Library. Ed Elliot stated that Hollis and

he documented the book titles some time ago. Ed will contact Hollis regarding the current status of the library since the books are being housed there. Mike Smith noted that one of the advantages of the library is that some of the books are very obscure and may matter to someone at times. Erich Rose has a program that would make the book list searchable by title and author. A lengthy discussion ensued regarding where to house the library since space is not available at the AGMS facility. Mike Smith expressed the need to store the library in a climate controlled facility otherwise the books risk deterioration or being eaten by silverfish. Kathleen Howard offered to house them in her house. PSoA will investigate obtaining shelving for Kathleen's house.
