"One of Texas' largest predators: new insights from a well-preserved skull of the theropod dinosaur Acrocanthosaurus atokensis"

Drew Eddy, M.S., PhD Student GSEC Member At Large, The University of Texas at Austin

"New information from a re-analysis of the skull of *Acrocanthosaurus*, an Early Cretaceous theropod from North America, supports its close phylogenetic relationship with large carcharodontosaurids that predominantly inhabited Africa and South America instead of the smaller North American theropod, *Allosaurus*."

"Drew Eddy grew up in the state of West Virginia, where he developed an appreciation for the natural world and all things related to the realm of science. After graduating at the top of his class from Point Pleasant High School, he attended Washington University in St. Louis, receiving a bachelor's degree in Earth & Planetary Sciences. He was then granted admission to graduate school under Dr. Julia Clarke at North Carolina State University in Raleigh, where he spent two years learning the basics of the field of vertebrate paleontology and describing the cranial anatomy of the large Theropod dinosaur, *Acrocanthosaurus atokensis*. During that time, Drew has conducted fieldwork in several areas across North and South America, including the Late Cretaceous Hell Creek Formation in Montana, the Triassic Chinle Formation in New Mexico, and the Eocene Paracas Formation in Peru. Presently, he is working towards a doctoral degree at the University of Texas at Austin, assessing recent changes in Quaternary bird and lizard faunas recorded by the cave systems of the Edwards Plateau of central Texas."

Harker Heights, Texas & Vicinity

Meet at 8:00AM at the small strip mall off Indian Trails on the south side of 190.

This trip will be to Harker Heights and other locations along US-190. We will be collecting from the Fredericksburg Group, Walnut and Comanche Peak Formations. Although many of you have collected these same formations in and around Austin the variety of fossils will be somewhat different with a few different types of echinoids being common as well as many other species of invertebrates we don't commonly see here.

Directions:

Take I35 north to Belton. Go west on US 190 to Harker Heights and exit at Indian Trails. Make the left onto Indian Trails, go under 190 and look for the small strip mall on the right, closest to the access road. We will meet there. Travel time from central Austin is about one hour and 15 minutes.

BUDGET

David Lindberg passed around a copy of the preliminary budget for 2010. PSA spent more money than was brought in during 2009. Discussion ensued regarding reducing newsletter costs by having members switch from paper copy to electronic copy and changing the PSA Membership Form to a default electronic copy of newsletter. David will merge the two checking accounts into one. The \$10,000 CD will be coming up for renewal soon. All told, PSA has approximately \$23,000 - \$24,000 between the two checking accounts and the CD. Mike Smith recommended that when the CD comes due and the two checking accounts are merged, the club should obtain additional CD's and ladder them. Mike recommended that \$16,000 be divided into 4 laddered CD's of \$4,000 each with one coming due each quarter in case the club needed access to it. Discussion took place regarding making a club donation to Ann Molineux for the Tucson trip she will be making in the spring. Ed Elliot will contact Ann and discuss an appropriate donation amount with her. Mike proposed that the club increase the scholarship funds from \$500 to \$1000. The 2009 actuals and the 2010 Proposed Budget should be printed in the upcoming newsletter.
