## **Late Pleistocene Non-analog Faunas and Their Significance**

Non-analog faunas are those faunas that contain associations of species that are now allopatric, i.e. no longer have overlapping geographic distributions. They are characteristic of late Pleistocene mammalian faunas of many continents. These associations often contain pairs of species with apparent conflicting ecological requirements. Examples from Texas Pleistocene faunas are: the ermine (*Mustela erminea*), the masked shrew (*Sorex cinereus*) and the southern bog lemming (*Synaptomys cooperi*) occurred at the same time with the fulvous harvest mouse (*Reithrodontomys fulvescens*), the rice rat (*Oryzomys palustris*) and hispid (*Perognathus hispidus*) on the Edwards Plateau. These associations imply climatic regimes that are not found today. They disappear about 11,000 YBP coincident with the extinction of the large mammals.

### PSA September Meeting Minutes

Minutes: 09/21/2010

Meeting called to order by Marilyn Austin at 7:00 pm.

A presentation "Geologic Wonders of Central Texas" was given by Dr. Leon E. Long of the Department of Geological Services, University of Texas. The northern part of central Texas is composed of sedimentary deposits lying on top of the continental crust. The sedimentary layer was deposited in the cretaceous period by the Interior Seaway. It covers all of what was to become Texas.

The Llano Uplift is older and deeper rock, exposed when the sedimentary layer was eroded away. The exposed rock is igneous rock, granite, whose disposition was not continuous.

Enchanted Rock is a batholith (a large body of intrusive igneous rock believed to have crystallized at a considerable depth below the earth's surface) in the Llano Uplift. It is composed of granite. The different colored crystals are:

- \* Pink - Feldspar (Potassium)
- \* White - Plagioclase Feldspar (Sodium)
- \* Grey - Quartz

Its coarse grain indicates it was formed deep in the earth.

The concepts of Inversion of Topography

and Fault Drag were explained. Onion Creek is an example of a meandering creek filled with grus or decomposed granite. Dr. Long invited club members to a field trip to the Llano Uplift on Saturday October 9th. It will be approximately ten hours long.

Details will be sent to club members via a separate email. Pilot Knob is the remains of a volcano. It was probably an explosive type of volcano and was probably completely submerged.
