Upcoming Field Trip

Pleistocene Fossils along the Brazos River

The Club will be collecting on the gravel bars of the Brazos River for Pleistocene-age fossils this month. You may also find arrowheads and other stone artifacts. This is a great trip when the weather is hot.

Meet at Stephen F. Austin State Park in San Felipe at the statue parking lot at 8:00 a.m. Traveling east on I-10, just east of Sealy, take exit 723 to FM1458 north (left) to the park. We will be launching from under the bridge just outside of the park. Bring whatever you would need for a day on the water: food, lots of water, a canoe or kayak, hat, collecting materials and packing material since some finds are fragile. Wear clothing that you won't mind getting in the red water. You will get wet and probably muddy. This trip is always a lot of fun.

As of the writing of the newsletter, the water level on the Brazos is a little high but on a downward trend. If it is too high, the gravel bars are underwater. If the water is too low, you spend more time dragging the boat than paddling. For this reason, the trip may need to be called off or changed. Please keep an eye out for e-mail updates. Fossil Fest Update

Save the date! The 25th Annual Fossil Fest will be Saturday to Sunday, November 14–15, 2015 (with set-up on Friday, November 13). This year's show theme is: Monster Marine Reptiles! We'll be exploring all the marine reptiles that roamed the Texas seaways. At this month's meeting, we'll talk about volunteering for Fossil Fest and helping to promote it by distributing Fossil Fest tear pads/flyers around Austin, such as public libraries, the Texas Memorial Museum, UT Geology Department, Walter Geology Library, Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center, Inner Space Cavern, Austin Nature & Science Center, Beverly Sheffield Education Center - Splash Exhibit, and the Thinkery. A basket with a labeled packet for each location (containing tear pads, flyers and instructions) will be left on the sign-in table. Please consider picking up a packet for that location and dropping it off by September 1 if you live, work or travel near one of these locations. Please send an e-mail to showchair@austinpaleo.org if you have ideas for other locations where we should advertise our annual show. The support and assistance of all members is essential in making Fossil Fest a success. There are many ways that members can help, so please stay tuned for upcoming opportunities!

We also encourage you to create an exhibit case for the show this year. We are looking to fill cases in the front room with marine reptile fossils to go along with our show theme. Additionally, we have a lot of display cases to fill in the Hall! We want to see those fossils you worked so hard to collect in searing heat, ankle-deep mud, slippery slopes, capsizing canoes or finger-numbing cold! So start sorting through your fossils now! Additionally, it would help us teach some key curriculum concepts to students. If you're in need of exhibit case ideas, please consider:

- Collection of fossils from a specific locality around Texas and surrounding area
- Collection of a specific type of fossil from localities all around Texas and surrounding area
- A display of how a plant or animal becomes a fossil
- Examples and a brief description of changes to an organism over time
- Collection of a particular organism and their structures
- One organism the characteristics used to identify it with samples and diagrams
- A fossil and display showing what we were able to learn about it (for instance "x" tells us in what type of climate/environment the organism would have lived. If it is a sea dwelling organism, is there anything that tells us whether it came from a deep or shallow ocean, cold/warm temperature, turbid/calm environment, etc.)

Lastly, I'd like to incorporate technology into the show this year. How do you use technology with respect to fossils, paleontology or your hobby? Is anyone digitizing their collection? Meeting Minutes

July 21, 2015

Erich gaveled the meeting to order at 7:06 p.m. He then passed out hard copies of the newsletter for those who had not seen it, and remarked that we have a nice turnout tonight even though the newsletter was delayed in being e-mailed. The meeting minutes were brought up for approval and the motion to approve passed. Erich asked those present if anyone would report on the latest field trip. Mike gave the latest Treasurer's statement. Erich said the we have received a request for volunteers to be officeholders of The South Central Federation of Mineralogical Societies (SCFMS), of which we are a member. SCFMS's convention will be in Austin this year and we have been asked by AGMS to host a local field trip in connection with their convention here, and concurrent with AGMS' Gem Capers annual show. Ed suggested Whiskey Bridge as a field trip that would be fun for the attendees, since it is fairly close and would yield good finds for all. Erich announced that we will be having an increased, substantial presence at Gem Capers this year. Cathy then presented a get well card for Frank and offered it to anyone wishing to sign a message for him. Mike said that the hats we have for sale are almost gone. Melvin then called for volunteers to bring refreshments for the upcoming meeting in August and beyond. Suzanne then announced that The FOSSIL Project, an organization dedicated to building connections, collaboration and education across the wide spectrum of fossil-interested communities, will be having a workshop conference in Dallas this fall and called for those interested in attending to sign up. She also noted that many of the attendees' expenses will be paid for by the conference. Please let her or Erich know if you may be interested in attending. Erich then asked Ed how the recent field trip went and Ed reported the details, including the fact that a group of fossil enthusiasts from the Williamson County group was there at the road cut at the same time as our own group. Earl reported that even though the group had cancelled the first portion of the field trip, he actually was able to collect some fossils from the pit in Waco as well as making it to the road cut later. Ed then announced the details for the upcoming field trip to the UT Vertebrate Lab at JJ Pickle Research Center in Austin. The parking requirements for the Research Center were outlined also. Erich noted some of the visitors, including Tomas and Judy from the D.C. area, who have been finding some local fossils. The door prizes were then won by Joe, Ryan, Earl, Erich, James, Tomas, Cathy, and Dave. We then took our refreshment break. Upon returning from our break, Ron announced tonight's speaker, Joshua Lively from UT, giving his talk on "Mosasaurs in Texas and Beyond". Lively, who has previously given talks to us on fossil turtles of the Western US, showed slides of Mosasaurs from Texas, related them to snakes and monitor lizards and presented new info regarding them based on newly-discovered, high-quality specimens. Lively outlined the numerous groups of these large Cretaceous-era swimming predators and noted the collecting of many specimens that was done by the Works Progress Administration during the 1930's. Then he told of his focus on contributing to modern scientific communities' overview for considering effects of climate change today by linking the known physical information about these fossil Mosasaurs with gathered data on these ancient reptiles' own climate change history from the same Cretaceous period in order to arrive at some useful conclusions to be drawn about potential climate change influence on living populations today. Lively then took questions from Earl and Paul regarding Mosasaur behavior. The meeting adjourned at 8:55, with Lively and his colleagues continuing to discuss Mosasaur identification as we cleaned up, visited with each other and departed for home.
